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
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

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

New Mexico sees surge in construction jobs

Construction jobs in New Mexico in November reached 50,000 for the first time since March 2009, largely through the oil boom in the state's southeast corner and the industrial boom near El Paso.

New Mexico had the 17th highest growth rate in construction jobs with a 6.2 percent gain in November over the prior year, according to the Associated General Contractors of America.

Statewide construction job growth exceeded the 5 percent growth in the biggest city, Albuquerque, in a state that added only 2,200 people to its population in the past year, according to the U.S. Census Bureau.

New Mexico also was one of 23 states to add jobs from October to November, which was the first month this year where fewer than half the states added construction jobs month-to-month, AGC noted.

New Mexico still has a way to go to reach its all-time peak, between 59,000 and 60,000 in 2006-08. New Mexico's construction job growth rate in November also falls behind fellow Western states Wyoming, Arizona and Nevada at first, second and third, respectively, on the AGC chart, and Oregon and Montana further down in the top 10.

Pacheco said eight to 10 oil companies are investing some \$1 billion in southeast New Mexico. Housing projects also are underway in Hobbs in Carlsbad.

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"You have a pipeline being built there," he said.

But Pacheco said construction also is abundant in Santa Teresa's four industrial parks. <u>Stampede Meat (/story/money/business/2018/12/06/stampede-meat-opens-sunland-park-new-mexico-plant-300-reporting-work-monday/2233171002/)</u> is moving into a former Tyson Foods plant.

New 120,000-square-foot, 140,000-square-foot and 100,000-square-foot industrial buildings are getting built in Santa Teresa and a 183,000-square-foot structure is in permitting, Pacheco said.

"We don't have any space available," Pacheco said. "We're looking for contractors to build industrial spec space right now."

Santa Teresa also is converting a 12-mile stretch of Pete V. Domenici Highway from asphalt to concrete and widening Airport Road from two to four lanes, and converting the surface from asphalt to concrete, Pacheco said.

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Hobbs Economy

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Lea County is noted for its rich oil and natural gas reserves, attracting international oil-related companies such as ConocoPhillips, Chevron and Baker Hughes.

Although the economy has benefited from the enormous wealth of the gas and oil reserves, the business community is diversified enough to create a balanced community with major stores mixed in with small, individually owned shops. The telecommunications business is booming, with Windstream Telecommunications, TDS and LEACO Rural Telephone Service prepared for new markets as Lea County continues to grow.

Tourism is increasing in importance in Lea County, with several new national-brand motels and restaurants building to accommodate the casino and horse track. The casino and race track attract more than 2.2 million people per year to play, be entertained and watch world-class horse racing. This is the only non-Native American-owned casino built as a Las Vegas-style casino in New Mexico. Live horse racing is scheduled for the months of September through December in Hobbs. This time of the year has great weather for both the horses and spectators. There is always simulcast (televised) horse racing every day at the race track.

The location of the URENCO USA uranium-enrichment facility in Lea County indicates the high-tech proficiency of the area. This \$4 billion facility enriches uranium for nuclear power plants throughout the world, supporting continued clean and affordable electrical power. Several related industries also are expanding or relocating their businesses for the opportunities Lea County offers.

Major cattle ranches and dairy farms dot the rural areas of Lea County along with agricultural farms that produce cotton, peanuts, chile, watermelon and pumpkins. The RMS Food processing plant located in Hobbs is a leading manufacturer of Boca Burger, a division of Kraft Foods, which markets many vegetarian and dietary substitutes made of soy for worldwide distribution.

Because Lea County is one of the largest counties in New Mexico by area, there are still opportunities for growth, and we invite prospective investors, businesses and manufactures to sometimes to see in the case of the case offers assistance in planning, financing and several benefits to help build your economic base.

Despite the impressive economic development, the most important aspect of doing business in Lea County is directly related to the residents. People in Lea County have a reputation for supporting locally owned and operated businesses. From independent oil producers to local shop owners, entrepreneurs are welcomed here.

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Devon Energy bringing office to Hobbs, New Mexico second in oil and gas rig count

Another major Permian oil and gas producer planned to open an office in southeast New Mexico, as production continued steadily in the region.

Devon Energy – headquartered in Oklahoma City – announced an office to open in Hobbs this summer to employ 40 of the company's 225 workers in the region, read a news release from the Economic Development Corporation of Lea County (EDCLC).

The office was planned to be in Bender Plaza in Hobbs, operating in 7,300 square feet of a former law firm and featuring private offices, conference rooms and an advanced technology data center.

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The new office would be one of five owned by Devon in the Permian Basin region of southeast New Mexico and West Texas.

In New Mexico, Devon has offices in Artesia and Roswell.

Senior Community Relations Specialist Shannon Johnson said the company already employs residents of Lea County and the new office will strengthen its position in the community.

"We appreciate being part of the fabric of Hobbs," she said. "We look forward to opening our new office and expanding our presence in the community."

Hobbs Mayor Sam Cobb said investments from major oil companies are essential to the city's economic growth.

Devon's operations in the Delaware Basin, a western portion of the Permian, operate on about 280,000 net acres with production in the area accounting for 14 percent of the company and reserves accounting for 13 percent, records show.

Those operations brought in about \$900 million in capital for 2019, per information on Devon's website.



The company's current focus in the Permian is on the Wolfcamp and Bone Spring formations, where the U.S. Geological Survey announced last year the discovery of the largest "continuous" oil and gas resource ever identifies.

The formations extend from northern Eddy County and western Lea County, south as far as Pecos and Reeves counties in Texas.

They hold an estimated 46.3 million barrels of oil and 281 trillion cubic feet of natural gas, along with 20 billion barrels of natural gas liquids (NGL).

XTO Energy, a subsidiary of Exxon Mobile recently entered into an agreement with the City of Carlsbad to build its regional headquarters on 47 acres in the Carlsbad Airport Industrial Park, accommodating up to 300 employees.

Production steady in New Mexico

Although the Permian Basin's rig count decline in the last year, New Mexico remained stable at more than 100 rigs in the past week.

Records from Baker Hughes showed the Permian's total rig county fell by 35 rigs in the last year, from 476 last year to 441 as of June 14.

All but two of New Mexico's 101 rigs were in the Permian, up from 93 rigs last year and holding steady from last week.

Of that total, records showed 54 rigs in Eddy County, 43 in Lea County and one in Chaves County.

All of those were oil rigs.


In the San Juan Basin of the northwest, there were two in San Juan County and one in Rio Arriba County, all natural gas.

New Mexico was tied for second with Oklahoma's rig count, and Louisiana was third with 70 rigs.

Meanwhile, oil prices began a slight recovery this week as NASDAQ reported West Texas Intermediate – a grade of oil used as a domestic pricing benchmark, trading at about \$54 per barrel, a slight increase from just under \$52 per barrels earlier this month.

But prices are still at one of the lowest points of the year, compared with the less than \$45 in January, but peaking at more than \$65 per barrels in April.

A Monday report from Drillinginfo blamed the losses on global market tensions and a declining demand for fossil fuel.

The report cited a growing U.S. oil inventory, overtaking demand.

It also pointed to trade tensions between the U.S. and China as slowing global economic growth.

"Trade tensions between the US and China, which are subduing global economic growth, may be addressed at the upcoming G20 meetings later in June, but neither side has publicly shown a strong interest in resolving the issues," read the report.

"Prices confirmed the recent trend of weak global demand outpacing the production cuts and geopolitical unrest to drive trader interests."
